The Persistence of Aldus Manutius



32nd Annual Conference of the AMERICAN PRINTING HISTORY ASSOCIATION OCTOBER 11-13, 2007 at the University of California, Los Angeles and the Getty Research Institute



ALDUS MANUTIUS (1452-1515), the renowned Renaissance printer, publisher and scholar, transformed the presentation of ancient Latin and Greek texts. His editions of classical literature were prepared by scholars in his employ, thus promoting accurate texts. He commissioned the first Italic type in existence from his punchcutter, Francesco Griffo of Bologna. The use of Italic type which allowed for more text on a page, in combination with a smaller format than usual, made books affordable for scholars. Other innovations included the creation of small capitals which he used brilliantly with his Italic type and the development of Greek typefaces with ligatures. His motto, festina lente, signifies make haste slowly and is represented by his famous dolphin and anchor pressmark. Aldus' typography and publishing program were admired and imitated in his time and continue to provide inspiration today. This conference in his honor encourages discussion about printing innovations since the inception of printing.

A highlight of the conference will be the keynote address, *Aldus, UCLA, and Me,* by H. George Fletcher, Brooke Russell Astor Director for Special Collections at the New York Public Library. He is the author of *New Aldine Studies* (1988) and *In Praise of Aldus Manutius* (1995).
